


Careers in the Curriculum Audit

Example of Careers in the Curriculum:

- Career contexts embedded into lessons (Subject learning, inserts, activities, case studies, plenaries)
- Careers and Progression pathways made visible
- Careers themed lessons or modules, opportunities for students encounters with subject relevant employers, higher education providers, alumni etc
- Careers related trips/visits
- Acknowledgement of the importance of essential transferable skills developed in class (listening, speaking, problem solving, creativity, resilience, ambition, leadership, teamwork etc)
- Stand-alone projects demonstrating subject skills and workplace applications
- Careers learning through co-curricular and/or extracurricular activities
- Careers related information displayed in classrooms and/or subject areas

Research	Understanding how mind-set affects ability. Self-awareness.	1	KS3 + 4
Case Studies	Understand and develop skills employers are looking for. Looking at difference within business and how different beliefs can impact others.	1	KS3 + 4
Discussions	Self-awareness and exploring careers that they could develop skills for in the future. Valuing their own and others diversity and equality.	2	KS3 + 4
Self-reflections	Understanding Time Management and the impact of this in the business industry. Understanding self-awareness.	2	KS3 + 4
Creating PowerPoints and CVs	Planning in adequate opportunities for careers – plenaries used for example to reflect on the ‘skills’ used in the lesson and what careers they could apply to. Certain allow for speaking and listening opportunities as well as extended writing in a range of settings applicable to careers and employability such as letter writing etc	3	KS4
